



FY17 Budget Amendment Overview

PURPOSE: provide Congress an overview of the Army's requirements represented in the DoD's FY17 "Request for Additional Appropriations."

\$8.3B (6% increase over PB17) in Base and OCO, funds critical requirements to: combat ISIS, restore some warfighter readiness and arrest the current and future readiness decline of America's Army. This request provides the much needed resources to support our Combatant Commanders in the fight, addresses current year readiness shortfall and is a critical first step to rebuilding America's Army, by setting the conditions for increased future readiness, provided stable budgets and additional resources in the coming years.

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Actions since February 2016 Rollout

- ❖ Force Management Level increases in CENTCOM AOR
 - OCO Amendment delivered to Congress in November 2016
 - \$3.3B in Army direct Appropriations and \$1.1B in ASFF, ITEF, STEF
- Change in Presidential Administrations SECDEF Guidance
 - Improve Warfighting Readiness
 - Achieve Program Balance
 - Build Capacity & Improve Lethality
- **❖ FY17 National Defense Authorization Act**
 - End Strength increases
 - Pay rate increases
- Operational Environment
 - Actions against ISIS (Iraq/Syria)
 - Continued aggressive posture by Russia
 - Iranian and North Korean missile tests
 - South China Sea tensions

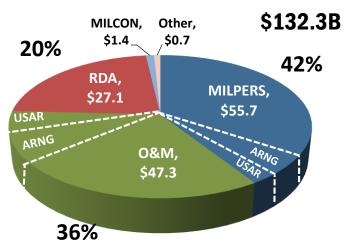

- ❖ Provides compensation adjustments in pay, subsistence, housing allowances, and bonus costs to support the FY17 28K increase in Total Army end strength as authorized in the NDAA (1,018K Total Force)
- **❖** Leverages existing MILPER asset from original PB17 request to buy down requirements incurred as a result of this increase.
- ❖ Rebalances funding across pay accounts to reflect change in officer/enlisted ratios due to NDAA end strength authorization

Training the Force

- Fully resources BCT(-) level of training proficiency for the remainder of the year
- Supports Initial Entry Training associated with end strength growth to 476K
- Funds Modernization at Combat Training Centers

Operating the Force

- Supports 24/7 operations for the Theater High Altitude Area Defense re-stationing to Korea
- Funds Brigade Combat Team conversions to increase lethality
- Increases funding for Aerial Intelligence Surveillance Reconnaissance operations around the world

Sustaining the Force

Supports Global Ammunition Management and the Ammunition Stockpile Reliability and Surveillance Program

❖ Installation/Enterprise Support

- Improves funding for the Army's five Regional Cyber Centers, Enterprise Network Operations and Cybersecurity
- Funds Army Facility Infrastructure Restoration and Modernization projects to improve Readiness Support across all Components

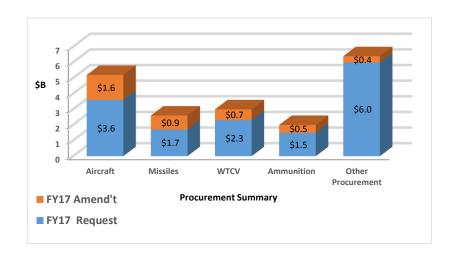

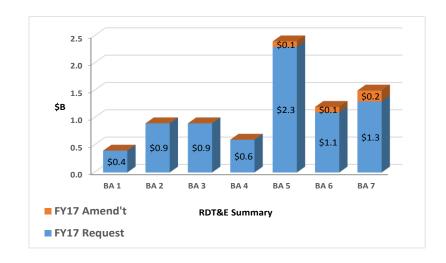
- Procures modernized fleets of Apache, Black Hawk, Gray Eagle and Shadow Unmanned Aerial Systems
- Accelerates critical investment in ground platforms, including newest variants of Abrams tanks, Bradley Fighting Vehicles, and Hercules recovery vehicles
- Increases Ammunition War Reserve Stocks and invests in industrial base for production of critical munitions supporting the current and future fight

Ensures formations possess the appropriate balance of lethality, mobility, protection

- Critical rapid capabilities, including:
 Electronic Warfare, Assured Position, Navigation, and Timing, and
 Aircraft Survivability equipment development
- Enhanced weapon system and munition lethality through engineering investments in Long Range Precision Fires, MLRS, mortar systems, Cannon Artillery Ammunition, and AT-4 Tandem warheads
- **❖** Improved Short Range Air Defense (SHORAD) to increase BCT survivability



Continued investment in emerging technologies and development solves future capability gaps

CONCLUSION

The Army's number one priority remains combat readiness. The FY17 Amendment Request:

- Restores some warfighter readiness
- Sets conditions for increased readiness in future years
- Combats ISIS
- Restores personnel readiness through increased end strength
- Invests in critical air and ground combat platforms
- Addresses critical current year shortfalls & emerging requirements

The FY17 Amendment Request "is a start" but needs to be followed by stable budgets and sustainable increased resourcing levels.

- It does NOT grow the force appreciably
- It does NOT increase future lethality
